

# Tips and Alternative Procedures

### Pilot® Guide Orientation



**Trocar Wound Closure** 



**Ligating Abdominal Wall Bleeders** Perpendicular to trocar wound. Try to align perpendicular to vessel.

# **Suturing Tips**









- To aid in smooth passage through tissue, ensure that the suture rests within the recessed portion of the suture passer.
- Recommended use with braided suture, monofilament suture can be too thick when doubled and may not allow the jaws of the Carter-Thomason CloseSure System® suture passer to close completely.
- To make suture retrieval easier, orient the suture toward the adjacent hole of the Pilot guide.

## Closing Multiple Port Sites Under Direct Visualization




#### STEP 1

- Use the laparoscope inserted in Site #1 to visualize Sites #2 and #3.
- Perform the CloseSure procedure on Site #2 and tie the suture.
- Initiate the CloseSure procedure on Site #3 but leave the suture untied.



#### STEP 2

- Move the laparoscope to Site #3 and visualize Site #1.
- Perform the CloseSure procedure on Site #1 and tie the suture.



#### STEP 3

• Remove the laparoscope from Site #3 and tie the suture to complete closure of all port sites under direct visualization.



# Ligating Bleeding Abdominal Wall Vessels




#### STEP 1

 Insert the Pilot<sup>®</sup> Guide with the holes aligned perpendicular to capture the vessel.




#### STEP 2

- Use the suture passer to push suture material through the Pilot Guide, fascia, muscle and peritoneum into the abdomen.
- Drop the suture and remove the suture passer.



#### STEP 3

- Push the suture passer through the opposite side of the Pilot Guide and surround the vessel.
- Pick up the suture and pull back through the peritoneum, muscle, fascia and Pilot Guide.



#### STEP 4

• Remove the Pilot Guide and tie off the bleeding vessel.

## Hernia Repair



#### STEP 1

- Measure the defect.
- Tailor a patch so that it extends approximately 3-5 cm beyond the hernia defect in all dimensions.




#### STEP 2

 Place four non-absorbable sutures, approximately 15-20 cm in length, at the edge of the patch in equidistant locations.

#### STEP 3

- Roll the patch along its long axis.
- Under visualization, introduce the patch into the abdomen through a trocar.



#### STEP 4

- Make four small incisions corresponding to the placement of each of the pre-tied sutures.
- Insert the Carter-Thomason® suture passer into the skin nick at an angle to capture the fascia.
- Push the suture passer through the fascia, muscle and peritoneum.
- Grasp one tail of the suture and pull it back through the skin; release the suture.

#### STEP 5

 Place the suture passer through the same skin nick again but at an opposite angle and repeat the procedure outlined in Step 4.

#### STEP 6

 Perform Steps 4 and 5 with the other three pre-tied sutures.

#### STEP 7

 Secure the mesh with tacks around its circumference and perform a fullthickness closure of all port sites using the appropriate Pilot Guides, making sure no intra-abdominal structures have been inadvertently captured.




## Full-thickness Trocar Wound Closure Procedure




#### STEP 1

 Insert the Pilot® Guide with the holes aligned perpendicular to the trocar wound. With a loaded suture passer, push the suture passer through fascia, muscle and peritoneum into the abdomen. Drop the suture and remove the suture passer.




#### STEP 2

 On the opposite side of the Pilot Guide, push the suture passer through all of the layers and pick up the suture with the hinged jaw.



STEP 3

 Pull the suture up through the peritoneum, muscle, fascia and Pilot Guide.



STEP 4

 Remove the Pilot Guide and tie off the suture.

**Result:**Complete fascial closure.



# Using the 15 mm Pilot® Guide



#### STEP 1

• Insert the Pilot® Guide with the holes aligned perpendicular to the trocar wound. With a loaded suture passer, starting with hole 1, push the suture passer through fascia, muscle and peritoneum into the abdomen. Drop the suture and remove the suture passer.



#### STEP 2

 On the opposite side of the Pilot Guide using hole 2, push the suture passer through all of the layers and pick up the suture with the hinged jaw.




STEP 3

 Pull the suture up through the peritoneum, muscle, fascia and Pilot Guide.



STEP 4

 Complete a second pass by replacing
 Steps 1-3 using another piece of suture and holes
 3 and 4.



STEP 5

• Remove the Pilot Guide and tie off the suture.

#### Result:

Complete fascial closure.
